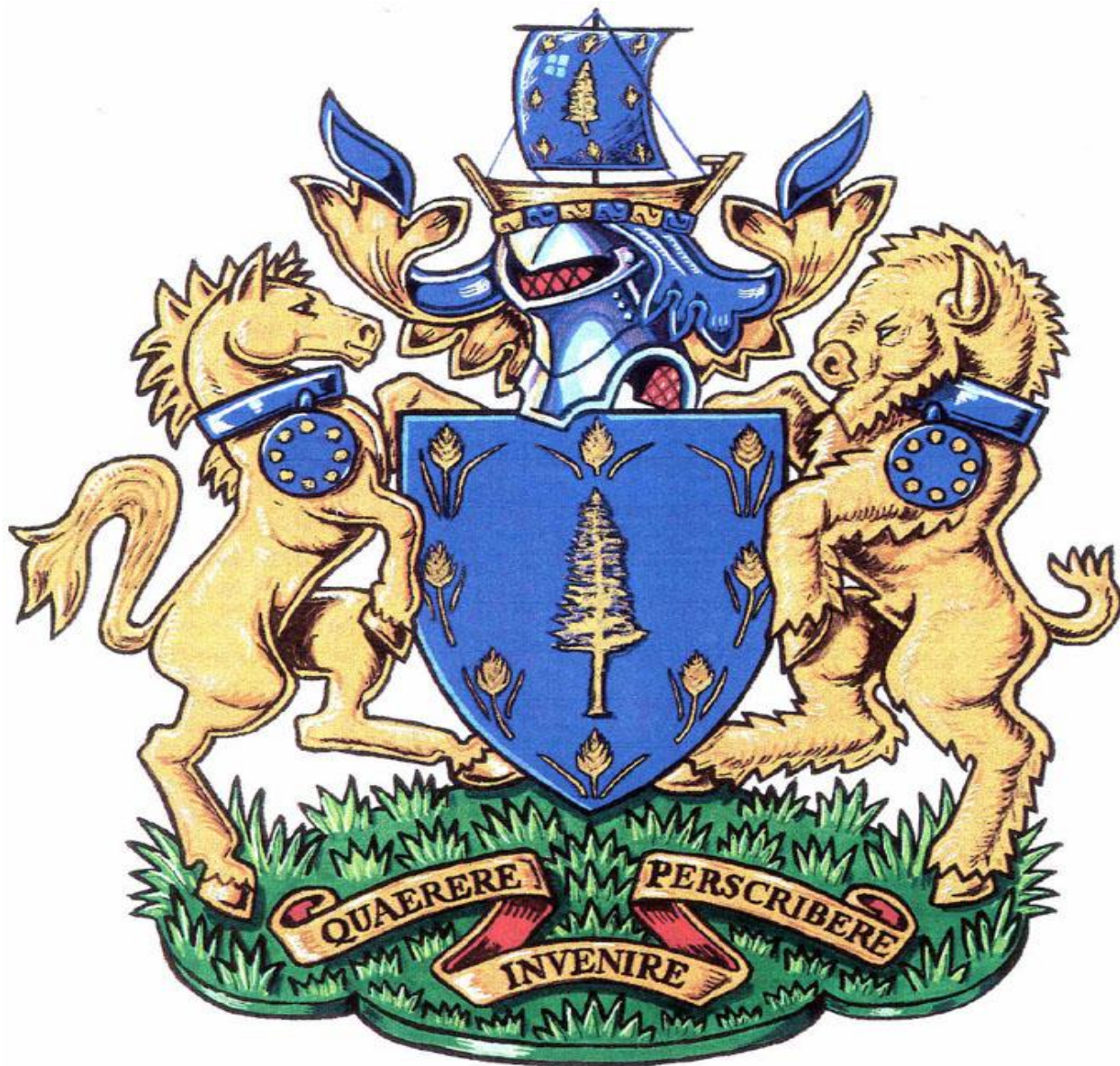

6. Financial Reports – Treasurer – Carolynne Ross
Carolynne presented the process involved in putting together facets of the various aspects of the 2024 audited statements and the 2024 budget. This included the Executive summary of the Richard “Dick” Nash Endowment Fund, the creation of a Consolidated Budget which was requested by the auditors (inclusion of branch budgets so 11 components) and additional branch financial support.

MOVED by Carolynne Ross that the AGS Audited Consolidated Financial Statements 2024 showing an income of \$229,365 and expenses of \$201,816 with a deficiency of expenses over revenues of \$27,549 be adopted as presented.
SECONDED by Al Bromling **CARRIED**

MOVED by Carolynne Ross that the AGS Compilation Engagement Report for AGS Provincial Office 2024 showing an income of \$169,495 and expenses of \$158,658 and an excess of revenue over expenses of \$10,837 be adopted as presented.
SECONDED by Deb Wickham **CARRIED**

MOVED by Carolynne Ross that the AGS Provincial Office 2024/25 budget be adopted as presented.
SECONDED by Craig Newman **CARRIED**

I have created a Google Sheet document for suggested speaker. There is a worksheet for each branch to add speakers they would recommend to other branches.

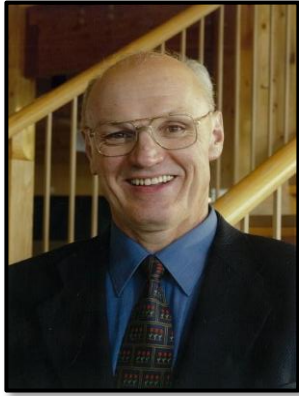

During 2025 the main activities of the Past President included the following:

Support for Executive transition: The spring period included the selection of a Second Vice President and an AGS Secretary to complete the Society Executive to ensure stable leadership for the 2025-27 period. One selection was by nomination/vote at the Annual General Meeting. The other by appointment of a volunteer who came forward. Their commitment is appreciated.

Liaison with Google Workspace project: This project was initiated in 2022 to acquire cost effective digital tools for collaboration and communication within our Society. As liaison executive for the Google Workspace Steering Committee, I am pleased that the membership of this initiative continues to grow. The AGS wide email changeover to Google Workspace was completed in 2025. There is a growing need for training opportunities for volunteers engaging in the Workspace project. Kudos to the members of the Steering Committee. Please see the Google Workspace Project report for details.

Finance and Endowment Management practices: I assisted as a member of the Standing Committee on Finance. The transition to a consolidated two-year operating budget has been demanding of volunteer time and creativity. The Finance Committee and the Board also have the challenge of responsibly integrating the Nash Endowment investment earnings into our operations. The Board members are challenged to become more

capable in these financial leadership roles. Details are in the financial reports.

Nominations Chair Activity: I have worked with the AGS Coordinator to prepare the Nomination Forms and Awards package for our elections and awards process toward the next Annual General Meeting. Succession planning for Society leadership roles is very challenging as volunteer fatigue is a factor at all levels of the organization.

The Policy and Bylaws Standing Committee: I assisted this committee in developing amendments to update the AGS Privacy policy, the Code of Conduct policy and to prepare amendments to AGS Bylaws for membership consideration. The ballot for voting on these amendments will be mailed with the election voting package and the results announced at the AGM. Details are in the standing committee report.

Society Advocacy Initiative: Members are concerned that the costs and fees for access to government records impede genealogy research in Alberta. The Board has initiated a member committee to establish a fact-based advocacy document.

As the Chair of the Policy and Procedure Committee and with the help of Al Bromling and David Clarke, the Privacy Policy was rewritten and was passed by the Board.

Also, the Code of Conduct was passed by the Board.

I sat on the Bylaws committee with David Clarke and Al Bromling—the result being several amendments to the Bylaws which have been sent out to the members to be voted on.

I have also agreed to sit on the committee to negotiate the new Shared Use Agreement with the Edmonton Branch.

Audit 2025

The audit was completed for the year 2025 by Louise Chauvet, CPA, CA and

her team at KBH Chartered Professional Accountants. KBH prepared Consolidated Financial Statements for the Society, which includes the income and expenses for the ten (10) branches and the Provincial Office. The AGS Branches that received a more in-depth review were Medicine Hat and Lethbridge, as both had casinos in 2024, as well as the AGS Edmonton and the AGS Provincial Office. A Compilation Engagement Report for the AGS Provincial Office was also prepared. The Consolidated Statement of Operations for the AGS Society showed an excess of revenue over expenses of \$94,960, with revenue

of \$307,453 and expenses of \$212,493.

These are some of the major variances (rounded):

Income 2025	\$307,453

Richard “Dick” Nash Endowment Fund

AGS received the final distribution of the Richard Nash Estate which was added to the principal bringing the total to \$453,209. The Richard “Dick” Nash Endowment Fund was valued at \$559,465 as of 31 December 2025.

Research

The AGS Research Chair has submitted this report.

***Relatively Speaking* Sustainability Fund**

The *Relatively Speaking* Sustainability Fund covered the fee for the *Relatively Speaking* Editor, publishing and mailing costs until the Fund was depleted. At the AGS September 2024 Board meeting it was approved that all future costs for *Relatively Speaking* would be included in the general operating expenses of the Society.

Membership Revitalization Reserve Fund

At the AGS September 2024 Board meeting, it was approved that this fund would be depleted by 31 December 2025.

Facility Manager

The position of Facility Manager reports to the AGS Treasurer. Bruce Boelstler and his team have performed minor maintenance repairs to the AGS Office and the AGS Edmonton Branch equipment, has completed and maintained the inventories of all holdings for the AGS Office and AGS Edmonton Branch, has updated and maintained the site security codes, and disposed of non-repairable furniture and equipment. Thank you for willingness to keep “watch” over Unit #162.

Bookkeeping

Shirley Keller, the AGS Bookkeeper, continues to provide excellent and efficient service to our Society. Not only does she do the bookkeeping for the Society, but she also consolidates all the financial information for the requirements of Revenue Canada; applies for the GST refunds for a number of the Branches and the Society; provides information, instruction and advice for the Branch Treasurers; maintains an excellent working relationship with our Office Coordinator, Shannon Cherkowski; provides assistance to the Grants & Other Funding Chair, Marion Rex Howard; prepares all financial material for the quarterly committee and Board meetings, and for the yearly audit, and assists in liaising with the auditors. She is a valued member of the financial aspect of the Society.

Finance Committee

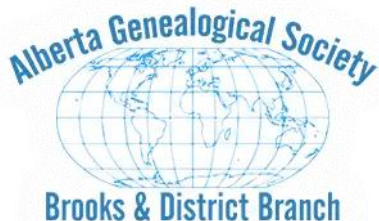

It was a unanimous decision to renew contracts in 2025 for Juanita, our paid Assistant, and Shirley our paid Bookkeeper. We were very impressed with the expertise of Jeannine Younger, our contracted Google Workspace Trainer and appreciated that

other AGS members supported her in the monthly training sessions.

We were offered an early Casino on September 18 and 19, 2025. Filling the various volunteer positions went fairly smoothly thanks to the generosity of the volunteer members of our Branch and also from our like-minded Community Organizations. As a result, AGLC deposited \$37,394.30 into our Casino Account.

Meetings

2025 Executive monthly Meetings were scheduled on the 2st Thursdays of each month except July, August, December, with our expanded Executive Committee of eight members. All of the meetings were in-person in the Isabel Campbell Room of the GP Public Library.

Our hybrid **AGM** on March 19 was hosted by the South Peace Regional Archives with 9 members in attendance.

Following the Business Meeting, Archives CEO, Elynn Vanderkerkhove, led a tour of their new Archives location followed by a talk on “*What is an Archive*” in which she encouraged donation of personal genealogical histories into their collection. In June, we were informed that the Grande Prairie Public Library informed us they could make better use of the Isabel Campbell Room, our home base for the last 20 odd years, and their decision to relocate us to a different area of the Library. We spent the rest of the year in communication and negotiation for the best-case scenario. Talks are ongoing.

Programs and Community Collaboration

Our ongoing programs that occasionally increase our memberships are:

Genies in the Library where our faithful volunteers receive clients on the 2nd and 4th Wednesdays (except the summer months), for drop-in or by appointment for one-on-one research assistance. Our Assistant has recently branched out to specialize in Metis Research. She has made use

of one of GP Branch’s perks of reimbursing costs up to \$700/person/year from Casino Proceeds for online training and/or travel.

Genies on the Road – a few of us travel and offer assistance to small groups for our Regional Libraries’ patrons, whenever they request our services.

Research Queries – our long-term researcher fills requests for obituaries look-ups and other local information by request. The charge is \$20/hour and clients can conveniently pay by e-transfer or PayPal through our bookkeeper to obtain immediate results.

Branch Library – our Branch Librarian monitors our large Genealogical Library, (Reference and Circulating) and is always on the lookout for additional materials.

Margaret Kay Memorial Bursary – The Margaret Kay Bursary, in the amount of \$1500, but had no applications in 2025.

Branch Databases – Additional information continues to be updated as indexing of obituaries from local and regional newspapers to the Website’s ‘Obituary Index’. One of our long-time remote members volunteered to scan obituaries from Regional Newspapers and Grande Prairie funeral homes. The Branch purchased a new scanner for her use for this important contribution.

Facebook Account – Our Assistant maintains a current, attractive and active page, recently announcing 7.7k views, 73 visits, 31 content interactions and a total of 114 followers.

Website – was added to our Assistant’s job description and we now boast a current and informative website that has seen 81 visits this past year.

Google Workspace Training – As part of our commitment to AGS members, GP & District Branch continues to contract Jeannine Younger. We were pleased to offer this incentive and service to AGS from our Casino Proceeds.

Community and Membership Programs

January 21 – we presented a mini hands-on Genealogical Workshop to 8 people from our local Retired Teachers' Group

Duties, Rules, and Procedures

The committee continues to meet and revise processes as required.

Library

We have over 1,500 resources catalogued in ResourceMate. There has been a significant improvement in the aesthetics of our library, and we are pleased with our resources, with 90% being available online. Going forward, we will be more selective with additions to our library, especially with donated items. Space has become an issue, and we want the library to reflect what we stand for regarding genealogy and local history.

In-library resources available to members include Newspaper.com, NewspaperArchive.com, AmericanAncestors.org, and FindMyPast.com. The library committee consistently updates members on available resources and makes requests for additional materials.

The library is open to the public on Wednesdays (except for the first Wednesday of the month), to visit our library for help with research or just to see what we are all about.

Projects

Our ongoing project continues to involve organizing all hard copies of obituaries, chronologically and alphabetically. We will then compare it with our online database, remove duplicates, and merge them all.

We have entered a booth in the Annual Home and

Trade Show (March 2026) in hopes of gaining new members. It will be interesting to see how the weekend goes.

Another priority project is rebranding our logo, so it better reflects what our society is about.

We are fortunate to have a branch supported by dedicated volunteers who contribute significant time and energy to our work. This year, each volunteer contributed an average of nearly 70 hours, and their commitment continues to be the foundation of our branch's success.

In January, we welcomed a speaker who introduced an engaging way to use AI to help compose family history narratives. Members collaborated by taking turns adding lines to a shared story, resulting in a full page of writing. The session was both informative and enjoyable.

February marked our Annual General Meeting. We were pleased to welcome Louise Ebessen as our new Vice President. She has already been a valuable asset to the branch and will be standing for President at the next AGM. All other executive positions remained unchanged, and we are grateful to those who continue to serve. Following the AGM, Jeannine Powell presented on FamilySearch and its newly implemented features. Her presentation was clear, informative, and well received.

In March, Louise Ebessen delivered a presentation on creating "cousin bait," focusing on the use of family history blogs to connect with others researching the same family lines. Members found the session practical and informative.

April featured a member-led "show and tell" in

place of a formal speaker. Members shared family artifacts and research materials, resulting in a wide variety of interesting and meaningful contributions. The Family History Fair was also held in April and saw strong attendance and positive feedback. A highlight for many was the presentation on Investigative Genetic Genealogy by a speaker from the Calgary RCMP. We look forward to hosting the event again next May.

In May, Jeannine Powell returned to present additional updates and new features on FamilySearch. We continue to appreciate her expertise and willingness to share her knowledge.

June concluded our regular meeting year with a year-end potluck. This year, we surveyed members using a Google Form to determine preferences. Members selected a catered chicken main with shared side dishes, along with a small fee to offset costs. The format was well-received and will likely be repeated next year.

There were no regular meetings in July and August; however, our cemetery recording group remained active. For more than three years, this team has been recording and uploading memorials to Find A Grave, contributing thousands of entries. While work in an active cemetery is never truly complete, the group is nearing a point where records are largely up to date. Their efforts will be of lasting value to future researchers.

Meetings resumed in September with a presentation by Lianne Kruger on Library and Archives Canada. She shared practical guidance on navigating the online database, which members found very helpful.

In October, Jessie Dial presented on researching Canadian military ancestors, covering the War of 1812, the First World War, and the Second World War. The presentation prompted thoughtful discussion and inspired members to further explore their own military connections.

November featured another presentation by Jeannine Powell, this time focusing on using the GRO UK website to locate missing family members, records, and children—particularly those who were born and died between census years.

December is traditionally a month without meetings for our branch.

Throughout the year, the Family History Writers SIG met monthly at the Provincial Archives. The group remains active and has developed a strong sense of community, often gathering socially after meetings and participating in seasonal events together.

From January through June, we co-hosted “*Bring, Brag, or Break*” with the Red Deer Public Library. This monthly group provided a welcoming space for participants to share items of interest and receive help with their research, supported by informal conversation and refreshments.

Beginning in September, “*Bring, Brag, or Break*” was replaced with “Roots and Branches,” a beginner-focused genealogy group aimed at mentoring new researchers and assisting those facing research challenges. Participation has been lower than anticipated, and we plan to return to the previous format in September 2026.

In 2026, the branch plans to resume regular publication of *Tree Climber*, the long-standing branch newsletter, following the appointment of a new editor. The branch also plans to host another Family History Fair and organize a group visit to the Provincial Archives. These initiatives are intended to strengthen member engagement, support retention, and increase awareness of the branch within the community.

Projects:

Archives: Wetaskiwin branch members continue to actively support the City of Wetaskiwin Archives. Some of our members are volunteering by assisting with inventory of the Archives' holdings and by entering data onto the spreadsheets created by City of Wetaskiwin staff. Branch members have been able to refer researchers to the Archives, and this is a step forward.

Project: *“Genealogy at the Museum – an afternoon of Fun”*

This event was held Wednesday, September 24, 2025, from 1:00-4:00pm. This was a free walk-in event, hosted by the Heritage Museum. Members of the Wetaskiwin branch provided the research, armed with information sheets about how to research in various parts of the world, information

on the Family Search Centre in Wetaskiwin and how to research there, our personal laptops to enable us to demonstrate free websites, etc. The advertising for the event was done by the Heritage Museum. Due to the format, branch members did not know how many people would show up; we were happy to have 10 eager people come to the walk-in event. The attendees ranged from people who had been researching their ancestors but wanted more help, to people who didn't do research but wanted to start working on their family history. Attendees came from local areas, and from an hour's drive away. We were very happy with the day. The Heritage Museum asked if we would be interested in co-hosting this event in 2026, and our branch has agreed to be involved again next year.

Branch Resource Centre: Our resources are now housed in a separate room at the Archives. The resources we have in our collection are available to those researching at the Archives.

Community Outreach: Branch Vice-President Nelda Layton is the Director of the Family Search Center in Wetaskiwin. She and her team provide training sessions and one-on-one assistance for those interested in researching their ancestors.

Battle Lake Ladies' Club: Branch member Olga Reade received special recognition as the historian for this group for over 30 years. Certificates from the County of Wetaskiwin and the Canadian government were presented to Olga. The club has just published *“The 91-year History of the Battle Lake Ladies Club 1934-2025”*.

Branch Members' Contribution to our Branch Newsletter and to RS:

Branch Member, Sharon Aney – Research for Manluk Theatre Society

Sharon Aney was approached in April 2025 to research the history of Wetaskiwin's Electric Light Building which was built in 1904. She has been researching the building's construction, usage and name changes as it housed the City's electricity generators, Calgary Power's water system, the Heritage Museum and other smaller enterprises over 100 years.

The building was purchased by the Manluk Theatre Society in 2006 and renovated to be the local live theatre venue. The Society is documenting the renovations it has made to the building and is researching "live theatre" in Wetaskiwin with plans to publish a book combining both stories.

Branch Member, Leroy Koop – Obituary Initiative

In 2024, Leroy Koop decided to (personally) collect and catalogue obituaries from local sources, and he

continues to do this in 2025. He focuses on Wetaskiwin City and County; creating a system that works for him. Lee has created obituary information in pdf format. A large percentage of the volunteer hours recorded for our branch have been the hours that Lee spends on this massive project.

Special Committee Reports

Google Workspace Steering Committee

In 2025, Grande Prairie Branch arranged and sponsored Jeannine Younger for monthly training sessions for AGS Members.

In January, Google Workspace role-based gmail accounts were activated for Edmonton, Camrose, Red Deer and Lethbridge. In February, Lethbridge Branch had implemented 5 role-based positions. The Provincial Executive, AGS Office Coordinator, Treasurer and Bookkeeper were invited to participate.

Calgary, Medicine Hat and Wetaskiwin Branches are using forwarding from their role assigned gmails to their original or personal addresses. Brooks and Drayton Valley Branches were planning on activating their role-based address and participating in Google Workspace asap. A number of these branches consequently moved ahead by setting up their folders and files under their respective Shared Drives.

In April, it was reported that the Executive part of Google Workspace was not working because of technical difficulties with Shout. Lianne Kruger was invited to the Google Workspace Team.

In September, Lianne, together with Mike McLuckie from MediaShaker, proposed that switching all Shout emails at once would be the best solution. Lianne will help AI in assisting those with a Shout address prepare for the migration to G. Workspace.

Mike agreed to assume the 2nd Super Administrator Position, along with Kelsey Carlisle. Doug Christian resigned from the Super-Admin.

AGS members must create a password to access ARNI. This password requirement is different than the login to the members only part of the AGS website. Once AGS members create a password, they are given access to the complete record information while non-members access limited details. Appreciation is expressed to Shannon Cherkowski (AGS Office Coordinator) who is very familiar with ARNI and is able to help people access the data and understand the process of retrieving information from the index.

In 2025, I participated in the AGS Edmonton Branch *Tracing Your Family Tree* course and demonstrated searching AGS Homestead Index, Alberta Name Index (ANI) and Alberta Records Name Index (ARNI).

AGS member Jock Howard commenced work, in 2025, on an extensive project for ARNI. He is converting data from the book *Index of Births, Marriages and Deaths of Drayton Valley and Surrounding Area in Alberta* published by the AGS Drayton Valley Branch into a format useable by ARNI.

Lorraine From continues to index the Vegreville newspaper obituaries from clippings provided by Blanche Thomson. Susan Laycock updated information from the Leduc Seventh Day Adventist Cemetery. Gail Wabasca has been recording information from various cemeteries in Alberta and providing AGS with copies.

“Our Family Roots” at the Art Gallery of Alberta

The collaboration between AGS and the Art Gallery of Alberta (AGA) continued for a fourth year with 108 students creating posters based on their Indigenous or Immigrant history. Lou Duigou, retired Edmonton Catholic Schools Area Superintendent and Lynne Duigou, an AGS Past President, judged the posters as to genealogical content, documentation, family tree, story and presentation of material. 46 posters were put on display in the TD Learning Gallery at the Art Gallery of Alberta “Our Family Roots” exhibition for the month of May 2025. A gala was held May 10, 2025 where the students whose work was being displayed received a certificate. Approximately 200 people were in attendance at this year’s celebration; everyone was given free access to viewing of all Art Gallery Exhibits and were treated to a juice and cookies reception sponsored by St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic School. This year’s posters featured the following: Austria, Bangladesh, Canada (Driftpile Cree Nation, Haida Nation, Iroquois Nation, Plains Cree, and Métis), Cyprus,

Dubai, England, France, Germany, India, Ireland, Liberia, Northern Ireland, Norway, Paraguay, Philippines, Poland, Scotland, Taiwan, The Netherlands, Ukraine, United States, and Zimbabwe. Guests certificate presenters included: Fatme Elkadry—Grants Coordinator at Edmonton Heritage Council, Jeri Wilson—Evergreen Catholic Schools Board Trustee, Derek Brown—Principal, St. Thomas Aquinas School. Others involved in the event were Lynne Duigou—Past President AGS who acted as emcee and presented certificates, Lou Duigou who acted as photographer, Jock Howard—Past President AGS who greeted guests and congratulated students, and Marion Rex Howard, project coordinator.

This was the 11th year that students at St. Thomas Aquinas participated in this Genealogy4Youth project; over the years 1,685 students from St. Thomas Aquinas school have received certificates. AGS has presented 1,832 students across Alberta with Genealogy4Youth project certificates. 45 of the students have written their family history stories, becoming published authors by submitting them to Alberta Genealogical Society’s *Journal Relatively Speaking*. *Relatively Speaking* goes to 650+ members, libraries and archives in Canada, USA, Australia, New Zealand, and Japan. This is the last year that Immigration and Indigenous history are part of the Social Studies curriculum in Grade 5.

Sponsorship

The Alberta Genealogical Society (AGS) is forever grateful for the funding received through sponsorship from the Government of Alberta and the Edmonton Heritage Council. AGS also relies on casino funding, general donations, and research income to help fund their activities.

Meetings Held

I attended the February, May, September, and November AGS board meetings, as well as the AGM in order to be current with AGS board business. I also met regularly with the bookkeeper and office coordinator, as well as virtual meetings held by the Finance Committee.

Grants

The Alberta Genealogical Society is very appreciative of the funding received through sponsorship from the Historic Resources Management Heritage Division and the Edmonton Heritage Council.

- **Historic Resources Management Heritage Division Sponsorship**—The Provincial Heritage Organizations are under the umbrella of the Historic Resources Management Heritage Division, funded by the Department of Arts, Culture, and Status of Women, Government of Alberta. In 2025, AGS received **\$29,000** (\$29,000 in 2024) which was gratefully applied to expenses incurred for our

publications, training programs, professional consultations, and general administration.

- **Edmonton Heritage Council (EHC) Sponsorship**—In 2025, AGS received **\$28,000** in operational funding from the EHC funded by the City of Edmonton (\$24,867 in 2024). We are so grateful for this funding which helps provide both staffing and operational support.
- **Edmonton Community Foundation** – In 2025, AGS received an **\$800** grant through the Edmonton Community Foundation as part of their directed donation program.

I took on the role of Chair in mid-2024, and I acknowledge that I am still learning the responsibilities that come with this position. The committee has met several times over the past year. Similar to the previous year, our meetings have focused on sharing ideas, resources and initiatives developed within the branches, exploring ways to enhance promotion, increase our membership numbers, and better serve our members.

A smaller committee—consisting of Bradley Pierson, Ruth McConnell, and me—has been working on a new design for the New Members Kit, initiated by the Edmonton Branch in collaboration with Grant McEwan design students. Additionally, Bradley has been researching a potential membership program.

We were tasked with determining how to consolidate the various membership levels into

fewer options. We proposed a suggestion that has been sent to the board.

During our discussions, we considered creating a subscription membership, similar to those offered by many paid genealogical websites, as well as providing options for automatic monthly donations.

The total number of memberships in 2025 was 632, with 37 Life and Honorary members. The total number of paid memberships in 2025 was 595, down from 622 at the end of 2024. AGS continues to support each branch with a financial contribution of \$750 plus \$22.50 per primary member, based on the previous year's membership numbers, and \$10 per secondary member.

AGS has held its third early-bird renewal contest, offering a complimentary membership as the prize, along with three DNA kits. The committee will evaluate the contest's value over the next few months.

Over the year, authors continued to submit informative and well-written articles. The theme of food traditions saw the greatest response, however there were some engaging articles about the other themes in which authors took the time to recall their own experiences along with comprehensive research.

I made a small adjustment to the request for articles for each issue – I stressed that the theme is for inspiration, and that any article related to genealogy and family history is welcome. This is in order to welcome any and all articles, as the theme may only relate to a select number of people.

Interactions with AGS branch personnel continued to be fruitful, and five articles from branch newsletters were re-printed with their permission. Celebrations of special anniversaries for the Drayton valley, Wetaskiwin and Camrose branches were highlighted over two *RS* issues.

Two articles about the Sheridan Lawrence family of northwestern Alberta were re-published with permission from an external source, the Peace River Remembers Vol II book published by the Sir Alexander Mackenzie Historical Society of Peace River.

Engaging with authors continues to be a rewarding experience. In 2025, 19 authors contributed articles, several in multiple issues. We had three new authors.

All the volunteers for *Relatively Speaking* continue to make my job a seamless experience. A special thanks to Denise Daubert, who continued contributing ABCs of Genealogy articles, along with fill articles in a couple of issues when empty spots needed filling. Shannon Cherkowski has also been a great support.

We learned that the desktop publishing software, Publisher, will no longer be supported by Microsoft as of October, 2026. A team consisting of David Clarke, Lynne Duigou, Marie Vieira and Kate Wilson has started looking into alternatives to Publisher.

As it has for many years, the Edmonton Public Schools Printing Department continued to print *RS* for us. The November issue was delayed due to the postal strike and a maintenance issue at the EPSB printer shop.



Research Services

The **AGS Research Services Committee** began meeting each Friday at the AGS

Library in 1999 and has continued to do so since that year.

During the year, 400 researchers requested copies of homestead records by first searching the AGS Homestead Index on the AGS website and then completing the Homestead Request Form. A response was sent back noting the process of ordering copies of the homestead files from AGS and advising that the early homestead files (1870 to 1930) are on Ancestry and can be accessed through that subscription website. Not all researchers move forward and order copies of the homestead files, a total of 163 (142 in 2024) requests were completed in 2025. Cost for copies is \$10 per file and 50 cents per page of copy. Files are scanned at the Provincial Archives of Alberta from the microfilms and sent to clients in PDF format. This meant no PAA copy charges and postage charges for AGS during 2025.

AGS also received 40 family history research queries (non-homestead) in 2025. Claudine Nelson, Pat Pettitt and Pam Forsyth were the team members who responded to these requests. They also responded to 21 queries received by AGS Edmonton as the Branch no longer supports a Research Services Committee. In responding to queries, the committee uses Alberta Name Index (ANI) on the Edmonton Branch website and Alberta Records Name Index (ARNI) on the AGS website. Both indexes provide information that moves the research forward in many of the queries.

Through dedicated efforts AGS Research Services Committee raised just over \$3,700 for AGS in 2025. With AGS offering payment options by e-Transfer and PayPal clients quickly respond to requests for payment.

Research team members also participated in the Tracing Your Family Tree course sponsored by AGS Edmonton Branch, Treasure Hunt Days at the Library organized by Lynne Duigou and the clean up and reorganizing of the back storage area of the Library.

Thank you to Shannon Cherkowski, AGS Office Coordinator, for handling the mail, emails, phone calls and query payments for the AGS Research Committee. Forty-six queries were first received by Shannon at her AGS email address and then forwarded to AGS Research. Her prompt and efficient attention to these matters is very much appreciated.

HIGHLIGHTS OF 2025

Alberta Genealogical Society – *Bringing the past to the present for the future!*

- Active since 1973, 2025 was our 53rd year of providing genealogical services to the community.
- Membership for 2025 totalled 632 compared to 656 in 2024, and 650 in 2023.
- Members reported 32,156 volunteer hours.
- AGS secured funding through membership fees, donations, casino funding, research queries and grants from both the Historic Resources Management Heritage Division and the Edmonton Heritage Council.
- AGS hosted a Casino on September 28 & 29, 2025 with the help of 43 volunteers working 390 hours and earning \$81,737.49.
- We published four issues of *Relatively Speaking*. Themes for the issues were: February—Food Traditions, May—Music & Dance, August—Home & Travel, and November—Through the Seasons.
- AGS continued to offer online access to MyHeritage Library and the ARNI (Alberta Records Name Index) database through the AGS website. The main office is also recognized as a Library Search Affiliate Library.
- Google Workspace Project is progressing with trainings scheduled for board members as the project moves forward.
- The Alberta Records Name Index (ARNI) now has 1,039,779 searchable records including cemetery records, grave markers, local history books, newspapers, and life events records (births, marriages and deaths).
- AGS held four Board of Directors' meetings, and a hybrid AGM April 26, 2025
- AGS held their annual conference April 26, 2025 as a Family History Fair in Red Deer, Alberta with a choice of 12 sessions in four time slots throughout the day. Speed Dating Genealogy Style was held over the lunch hour. Over 100 participants attended the conference.
- The Policies and Procedures/Bylaws Committee continued to update policies, particularly the Code of Conduct policy.
- The Research Committee responded to 163 homestead records requests from 400 researchers.
- 29 Outstanding AGS Volunteers were honored with certificates. This included long-term membership certificates for two members for 50-year years of membership, two members for 40 years of membership and 13 members for 25 years of membership.
- 108 students were presented certificates for completion of Genealogy4Youth projects.
- 108 students had their genealogy posters on display at the Art Gallery of Alberta and received certificates for their work.
