

- ✓ To provide a centre and suitable meeting place for various activities of the Society and its members by rent or purchase or otherwise.
- ✓ To encourage the establishment of Branches of the Society under such terms and conditions as the Bylaws of the Society may from time to time provide.
- ✓ To achieve the foregoing objects, funds may be raised and donations, gifts, legacies and bequests accepted.

The ‘Statement of Dissolution’ was read by the Secretary
Having been in a state of dormancy for a period of one year, according to Bylaw 7.2 - Dormancy, and having met all requirements as outlined in Bylaw 7.3 - Dissolution, the Peace River Branch of the Alberta Genealogical Society is now dissolved. The Statement of Dissolution, monetary assets, financial records, and minutes will be kept secure by the Society for a period of five years ending April 23, 2021.

As Chair of Bylaws, Jo Nuthack has been approached by the executive of several small branches regarding the difficulty to fill the elected positions. It has become necessary for some of the Presidents to stay beyond the years specified in the Society Bylaws.

Jo recommended that the Bylaws Chair and committee consider amendments allowing for alternatives such as the extension of terms for the Presidents of Branches with the exception of Edmonton Branch.
He suggested, as well, that the Board consider a review of the Bylaws as a whole. The last review took place in early 2000.

EXECUTIVE REPORTS

President – Robert Franz

According to Chinese astrology, 2016 was the year of the fire monkey. Individuals born in this year were described as being ambitious and adventurous but irritable and 2016 was predicted as an unlucky year requiring caution. This being my first year as President and in a sense a rebirth of AGS, in reviewing this past year, the description and caution seems apt. AGS embarked on several ambitious and adventurous initiatives which resulted in marked discontent and irritability among some members and reminded the current executive of the need to proceed with caution.

Susan Haga, President from January to April, finished her year visiting several AGS branches, one of the goals of her presidency. The year began for myself and the 2016 Board of Directors with the major challenge of projected declining revenue and declining membership with increasing costs of providing services including web development and publishing our journal *Relatively Speaking*. To cut expenses, the February Board of Directors meeting was held at the Providence Centre. Final analysis proved the move not to have a significant cost advantage in that savings in accommodation were offset by added costs for meals. With great relief and thanks to the efforts of Marion Rex and Jean Gray and their committees, the dire projections regarding finances and membership did not materialize.

The ‘GenFair’ was held April 23, hosted most ably by Drayton Valley. Accolades on a job well done go to all volunteers involved. The fair differed from past fairs in taking the risk of including three speakers in addition to the traditional booths, and this daring change proved to be a huge success in the end.

Elections at the AGM saw a number of changes in the Executive with myself being acclaimed President, Norma Wolowyk elected Secretary

and Marion Rex elected Treasurer. Most Committee Chairs were reappointed for another term; however, with the resignations of Jo Nuthack and Mary Ann Legris respectively, Al Bromling was elected Parliamentarian and Jean Gray was elected Chair of the Policies and Procedures Committee.

At the May 25 Board of Directors meeting, I identified three pillars of my Presidency:

- enhancing services and support to AGS Members and Branches,
- promotion and collaboration with Potential Members and Parallel Agencies, and
- addressing the health of the Board and Committees.

With the encouragement of Wayne Shephard and Lyn Meehan, I posted a first ever President’s column called “*Let’s Talk*” on our website in an effort to reach not just the membership but beyond, with the hope of attracting new members to the Society.

At the end of June, I called a Superordinary meeting of the Executive to address the intensity of the response received to the Board’s decision to switch delivery of *Relatively Speaking* to a digital format as well as to the resignation of the RS Editor. This meeting was conducted by video conference July 6 and resulted in two motions:

1. that the AGS Board of Directors reassess the Board’s decision to go 100% digital in printing/delivery of *Relatively Speaking* in 2017, and
2. that the Executive recommend to the Board of Directors that they accept the resignation of Wayne Shephard, Editor of *Relatively Speaking*.

In July, the Associate Editor of *Relatively Speaking* also resigned.

Meanwhile, the AGS was present at a number of events in the Alberta community during the summer. In August, Donna Shanks and John Althouse represented AGS at the “Gathering of

the Victoria Settlement” in Victoria. Susan Haga and Miriam Roberts attended the “North American Festival of Wales” in Calgary and Bob Franz attended the “Society for Germany Genealogy in Eastern Europe Conference”.

The August 2016 issue of *Relatively Speaking* under the editorship of Wayne Shephard saw the first interprovincial collaboration between Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba on a joint feature on the NWMP which received much attention and praise. In August the Board instituted the Peter Staveley Memorial Award for significant contribution to *Relative Speaking* which will be awarded for the first time in 2017. An increasing number of members are expressing a desire to receive *Relatively Speaking* in a digital format and there are early indications that AGS membership requests are on the increase.

A Board Development Facilitator from Culture and Tourism was engaged to lead the Board and AGS Committee Chairs through a workshop on the morning of September 24 at the Annual Retreat at Providence Centre. Six issues facing the Society were identified and the President was charged with raising these issues at subsequent meetings for discussion and resolution.

As President of the Society, I was invited by the Edmonton Branch to attend their Volunteer Appreciation Luncheon on October 1 with expenses paid by the Edmonton Branch. While in Edmonton, I also met with the Office Coordinator and briefly with some of the Executive members of the Edmonton Branch. It was a very enjoyable and productive day, and I extend sincere thanks to the Edmonton Branch for the opportunity to meet with them and to exchange thoughts on what is happening in the Society.

In November, the Board of Directors met for a record virtual meeting (using BlueJeans video conferencing technology) of five hours and ten minutes, cutting costs while covering much ground.

By the end of 2016, the Society was being promoted on Facebook, Pinterest, Twitter and Family Search Wiki. Our webpage was being

used more and more frequently and had received acclaim from genealogy and family history societies and bloggers nationally and internationally.

The problems we have addressed this year regarding content management technology, delivery of our Journal, internal communication and cooperation between departments can all be accredited, in part, to our continued growth and success. This coming year, our Annual Conference will see a change in venue as we have outgrown our previous location, again reflecting the success and growth of this society. That growth and success, is the direct result of the leadership provided at each of the local branches and by your Provincial Executive and Board of Directors. Most of all, it is due to the support received from you, the membership.

My first eight months as your President have been challenging as we addressed concerns associated with our growth and change, but also rewarding, and I thank you for the opportunity to help strengthen our mission of promoting the study of genealogy and genealogical research in this province.

I thank him for hanging in there as there have been some challenging times since he became President in April, 2016.

I also thank Drayton Valley President Connie Stuhl and her committee for putting on a great GenFair and encouraging the other Branches to be willing to do the same. The Annual General Meeting of the Society is always an important part of our GenFairs and Conferences and it is

important for members from across the province to attend.

I am part of the Retreat Committee and have been for a number of years. It keeps me fairly busy especially this year with Maxine going on a lengthy tour to the Ukraine right before the Retreat, so there were a lot of last minute details to finalize. AGS social media has continued to grow over the last year. My participation in #GenChat and #AncestryHour has helped. Tweeting about the conference has also helped. Thank you Laura for your continued work.

Databases

We have not made any progress yet on the cemetery database but I believe we have a small idea of a plan to go into the new year.

Website

The website is wonderful. Many great resources have been added. The website has been a tremendous asset for the conference. Thank you Lyn.

Conference

I was asked to organize the GenFair with the Alberta Family History Society (AFHS) in Calgary. Unfortunately that did not work for 2016. I asked which branch would like to help and Connie with her Drayton Valley branch organized the GenFair for us. They did a great job.

I have organized the 2017 conference which will be held in Edmonton using the theme and ideas I had for the 2016 GenFair. I have had volunteers from a variety of branches. It has been good to have other branches involved, from the north to the south. I found a hotel that can handle the size of our conference with everything on one floor. The Radisson has been wonderful to work with and will cost less than our previous venue.

Second Vice President – Jean Gray

This is my second and last year as 2nd VP and it has been a challenge.

Chairing the Membership Committee for all of 2015 and again for part of 2016 was educational and provided an opportunity to work with the Communications and Website content manager updating the New Member's Kit, renewal application form and the membership cards. It also showed me the value of the data that our Shout program is collecting to give us information in planning for the future.

The 2nd VP is also the executive member to whom the Editor of *Relatively Speaking* reports. The resignation of our editor, Wayne Shephard, and his committee was unfortunate. A committee was created to interview any applicants who would apply and the plan is to have *Relatively Speaking* published again early in 2017.

Translations is the last area of my responsibility. There were no translation requests this year.

I was the Executive member who chaired the Policies and Procedure Committee for part of 2016 and whose report is included on page 40 of this Annual Report.

Our society has an Operations Manual outlining the position descriptions and responsibilities of our Committee Chairs. The Board appoints committee chairs to carry out this work. Board members and society members must support these committee chairs and their committees. This organization of the work load was established for the Society to function well. Let's use it for the benefit and improvement of the Alberta Genealogical Society.

Surplus in 2016

We finished the 2016 year with a surplus. This is due, in part, to the following:

- Higher than budgeted membership
- Higher than anticipated AHRF grant
- Donation from Cold Lake Genealogy Club of \$2,075.35
- Higher than anticipated rent rebate due to less snow removal
- Lower costs for publishing *Relatively Speaking* because we published three issues, not four.
- Lower than anticipated library book purchases
- Lower than anticipated Board travel because the November videoconference was held with each board member joining the conference from home through BlueJeans, our videoconferencing interface rather than from localized submeetings
- Purchase of a \$2,000 fire resistant file cabinet scheduled to be made at year-end if funds were available was cancelled when we learned that casino funding could be down by as much as \$20,000 in 2017 based on information that we received about the most current payouts being made

At year-end, the intent was to use the surplus to help balance the 2017 budget in anticipation of the casino shortfall.

Bookkeeping

This year was the second full year that Shirley Keller, our part-time, contract bookkeeper, has provided bookkeeping services for Alberta Genealogical Society. She does all the AGS provincial bookkeeping and helps to coordinate and consolidate all financial information provided by the Branches so we can report to Revenue Canada. She also completes the GST and charity returns. She has developed an excellent working relationship with Linda Winski, our Office Coordinator, in balancing funding raised through memberships, donations and conference registrations. Her help is invaluable in providing the data required for grant applications and working with the auditors. She has also developed many processes that have helped to improve efficiencies for AGS.

Gaming

A casino was held in 2015, one of the largest ever for AGS. In 2016, deferred funding helped offset the costs of insurance coverage for AGS and all of its Branches, as well as rent for the AGS facility in Edmonton. My thanks to Laura Turnbull for chairing this important revenue stream, and to all the volunteers who make this event possible. Please see Laura Turnbull's Gaming report for more information.

Grants & Other Funding

The Alberta Genealogical Society (Provincial) is very appreciative of the funding received through sponsorship from the Alberta Historical Resources Foundation (\$36,170) and the Edmonton Heritage Council (\$23,029). The sponsorship received from AHRF is applied to expenses incurred for our publications, training programs, professional consultations and general administration. Funding received from EHC helps provide both staffing and operational support.

The final report for the Community Initiative Program (CIP) grant for computers and videoconferencing equipment was submitted. Thanks to CIP funding, we now have new computers for the office manager and bookkeeper as well as webcam and a speaker for videoconferencing.

Thanks to the generosity of its members, businesses and other non-profit associations, AGS provincial (\$3,486) and its Branches (\$11,073) received \$14,559 in donations. We are grateful to all of our generous donors.

AGS Provincial is also very appreciative of the **Cold Lake Genealogy Club**'s donation in the amount of \$2,075.35 when they closed their group. Please see the Grants & Other Funding report for more information.

Research

In 2016, AGS consolidated raised \$8,335.26 by answering research queries. AGS Provincial (\$3,507.44) and its Branches (\$4,827.82) raised a total of \$8,335.26 by answering research queries, for the most part by providing answers to family research questions, as well as hard copies of Alberta Homestead Records, Alberta Land records, cemetery records and obituaries as a result of finding aids that we have online.

Thanks to the members of Edmonton Branch for answering the questions directed to the provincial office. My sincere gratitude to Norma Wolowyk and her team for their efforts in providing genealogical research and support for those who make queries to AGS realizing over \$3,500 in funding to AGS. Please see Norma Wolowyk's Research report for more information.

Finance Committee

My thanks to the Finance Committee: Jock Howard (Past VP Finance), Donna Shanks (Edmonton Branch President), Laura Turnbull (Gaming Chair), and Norma Wolowyk (Research Chair) for helping to guide the financial decisions for the Alberta Genealogical Society. 

March. Past President, Eileen French, lead us through the web site "Find a Grave" and enlightened us on the many features of this site and others shared their research on similar sites. Several of our members also attended a workshop on Casinos.

April. April brought us a comprehensive and informative review of the history of the airplane. Dane "From the Food Bank Downstairs" brought us several dozen plastic airplanes he has built from scratch and detailed along with a history of each airplane and its pilot.

Also in April, Carol Anderson and Bob Franz attended the GenFair and AGM in Drayton

Valley. An excellent time was spent at the Fair with informative speakers and interesting displays. Brooks and District Branch set up a display on our activities which attracted much interest from those in attendance.

We have all seen many museums in our lifetimes, but it was unanimously agreed that we have never seen one as well-stocked and as well-organized as the one we had just seen. We then visited the Canadian National Historical Windmill Center on the grounds of the museum, a collection of original and reconstructed windmills. After refreshing ourselves with homemade pie at the museum, we continued on our way to Red Rock Coulee, a collection of glacial rocks deposited along a stretch of coulee

in the County of Forty Mile. After hiking about the rocks and leaning into the westerly winds, we returned to our cars and headed to Redcliff for coffee at their new A & W, and returned up the TransCanada to Brooks. A most enjoyable and highly recommended outing.

June also brought the tragic death of Lyle William Kloth, one of our members. Lyle was crossing the street in his motorized scooter when he was struck by a hit and run driver. Eighty-three years of age, he died of his injuries. Lyle was a quiet, personal man and a loyal member who never failed to attend our monthly meetings and social gatherings and he will be greatly missed.

July. Canada Day saw members once again manning a booth at the Brooks and District Museum which was well attended by those celebrating Canada Day festivities dropping by to chat or to see what we were about.

August. Our executive met on August 24 to discuss what is happening at AGS provincially and to plan our events and activities for the fall.

September. AGS Past President Susan Haga presented four one-hour sessions on genealogy in the hopes of attracting new members. We kicked off our fall program with a sharing session on research over the summer and April from the Family History Centre gave a presentation on the services available at the newly reopened Centre.



President: 2016 has been a busy year at Edmonton Branch. In addition to the general duties as president, I represented AGS and Edmonton at the Gathering at Victoria Settlement in August. I also hosted the Volunteer Appreciation Lunch on October 1 on behalf of the Branch Executive.

Our **Vice President**, Valerie Rappel, was unable to complete her term due to health issues, so we were without a Vice President for part of the year.

Past President, Lynne Duigou, acted as nominations chair and secured nominations to fill vacancies on the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors for 2015-16 and 2016-17. She also chaired the Branch General Meeting while the President was ill and the Vice President was out of the country.

In 2016, Lynne presented a session at Tracing Your Family Free (TYFT) on Immigration, Emigration and land records; co-chaired the Canada/USA special interest group (SIG); made a presentation at the Postscripts SIG on how she and her husband Lou wrote a 400 page history book for Lou's family's 100 year celebration of their arrival in Canada; and she spoke to interested groups about the Society and Edmonton Branch.

Ken Fearnley was elected to the position of **Treasurer** and has been receiving training from

AGS Bookkeeper, Shirley Keller. Ken's background in business will be an asset to the Branch and AGS

Library Committee members, Arlene Borgstede, Heather Harper, Leanne Templeton and Lynn Fogwill continued to do an excellent job for the Branch and AGS in 2016. With the overall aim to increase membership, library usage and patron satisfaction, the committee focused on identifying ways to better meet user needs. This included consultations with Branch members at a general meeting, distribution of an electronic survey to all Edmonton Branch members, and a physical questionnaire completed at the Library by visiting researchers (be they members or guests). The information-gathering process took about four months and the results were compiled by Lynn Fogwill and the committee into a report entitled: *AGS – Edmonton Branch Library, The Next Ten Years*. The report and its recommendations were submitted to the Edmonton Branch Executive in the fall of 2016 with the hope that they will be accepted in January 2017 as a tool for the committee to use moving forward to assess future projects, weigh ideas against proven user feedback, and facilitate the distribution and allocation of resources.

A few requests for **volunteer work** that could be completed at home resulted in new work being done on the Local History Book Indexing Project. Norma Wolowyk assisted in setting up an Excel sheet that requires only basic typing skills to enter names and pages into columns. This project is once again open and ongoing.

Acquisitions: After six months of discussions with librarians from the Stanley Milner Branch of the Edmonton Public Library (EPL), we acquired four boxes of materials from the Heritage Collection prior to their move/closure. These are being sorted and will be shared with other branches if they prove to be duplicates or beyond the scope of our collection.

Membership Director Janet Cooper reported that, in 2016, we had 431 memberships totalling 499 members. This indicates an increase of 61 members over last year with a total of 69 families. Three members reached the 25 year mark and will be honored at the annual meeting. Those qualifying include Fran Losie, Noel Nicolson and Shirley Machan.

We mourned the passing of the following Branch members in 2016: Lorraine Yackulic; Claudette Vague; John Stirling Bradley; Peter Goutbeck; Lorrain (Larry) Clark and Lucille Horne.

The Edmonton Branch Newsletter, “Clandigger” is compiled by John Althouse. He reported that in 2016, he continued developing the theme of volunteerism. “Clandigger” provided coverage of the GenFair with the help of photographs and input from members. A way to provide copies of this newsletter to Branch members without email was devised since a paper copy is not provided to members who have email. However, should any member desire a print copy, the resources to produce a copy are available at the AGS Library. John forwarded online copies of “Clandigger” to all AGS Branches for inclusion in their library and for their newsletter editor’s reference. Thanks to all who have assisted in any way.

Edmonton Branch will be seeking a new Editor for “Clandigger” in 2017 as John wishes to step away from this role. He graciously offered to provide an orientation to anyone wishing to take up this challenge.

Tracing Your Family Tree (TYFT) Courses and Outreach

Director Colleen Murray had a busy 2016. A one-day “Tracing your Family Tree - Kickstart” course was organized for June. There were 26 students and the new format was received with enthusiasm. In order to cover some of the

missed topics from the three-day course, another one-day course entitled “Tracing your Family Tree-the Basics” was offered in October.

The topic of DNA was added to TYFT for the first time, as well as several traditional topics. Fifteen students attended and again, the one day class was well-received in spite of having a lot of content and was a bit rushed. New one day workshops are being planned for 2017 on topics of interest to members and others.

The **Research Services Committee** for both AGS and Edmonton Branch AGS has been meeting each Friday at the AGS Library since 1999 and continued to do so in 2016.

258 queries (229 in 2015) were processed by Edmonton Branch AGS during 2016. For AGS, they processed 144 (177 in 2015). The total number of queries handled by the Committee during the year was 402. There was a 7% increase, 13% to 20%, in queries received through the Edmonton Branch email address. This increase is a result of the Edmonton Journal Obituary Index (1950-1982) being placed on the Branch website and the addition of more records added to the probate indexes.

Monthly Public Programs:

Our **January** public program was built around member stories about favourite female ancestors. Members shared stories, pictures and mementos and, of course, the brick walls each had to surpass to get these interesting stories. In **February**, the Branch Annual meeting approved the annual budget plan and elected the new Executive as noted above.

At our **March meeting**, we hosted a well-attended public presentation by **Dianne Carrell** on FamilySearch.org. Most family researchers regularly use FamilySearch, but only a presenter like Dianne can show the full potential of these research tools and databases.

Our **April meeting** included a presentation, by **Patricia Greber**, about the online memorial to the soldiers of the South Peace on the website of the South Peace Regional Archives. There are currently 900 WWI and 2000 WWII persons on the memorial database. Also in April, Branch members attended the **AGS Annual meeting and GenFair**. Kudos to the planning committee and the folks at Drayton Valley for hosting a top quality **2016 GenFair—Pulling Together Your Family History**.

At our **May meeting**, one of our long serving members, **Wilma Friesen**, presented the story of her father who came to Canada as one of the British Home Children. She also discussed the larger context of the Home Children period in UK and Canada.

Our **June** meeting continued the Branch tradition of a picnic and fieldtrip to a local site that is of genealogical or historical interest. Fifteen members and guests were hosted by **Betty and Orval Sorkin** who showcased their family histories village. The Sorkinville project is an important private initiative to collect, restore and preserve buildings and equipment of the pioneer families in the south Peace region.

For our **September** gathering, our featured speaker was Wayne Shephard from Calgary. His discussion of the role of natural phenomena in shaping our family histories was insightful and generated a lively Q and A.

Our **October** meeting program included a presentation by **Mary Nutting** and an extensive Q and A on the matter of document digitization needs in our region. Both the South Peace Regional Archives and the AGS Branch in Grande Prairie have collections of single copy documents/publications that would be more accessible for researchers if they were online in searchable format.

For our **November 22** meeting, we were treated to a double presentation from **Lloyd and Val Robinson**, from the Medicine Hat Branch. Lloyd presented an update on the **Alberta Telephone Directory** scanning project. In a separate program, Lloyd and Val used role playing and dialogue to share some fascinating stories from the Mayflower portion of their family tree.

Larger Public Events:

On February 20, we hosted our annual **Family History Day** event. This is a joint venture with the Grande Prairie Public Library and the South Peace Regional Archives. We hosted four Webinars: crafting ancestor profiles, Facebook tips, Google tips and DNA testing. Our program included a version of "Who Do You Think You Are?" Our volunteers researched the families of two community personalities—one an archbishop and the other a radio show host. The Family History documents prepared were presented to the celebrities in handsome three ring binders during our Family History Day celebrations.

Publicity: Past President, Jean Gray looked after the publicity for the monthly branch meetings. Posters were created and emailed to our members by Gwen Richards. The posters were

also emailed to 7 area libraries and put on the community bulletin board in the Grande Prairie library as well as in the Isabel Campbell Room. The community calendar of the Daily Herald Tribune was also used to promote our events and meetings.

Cemeteries: Jean also served on the Cemetery committee and with Maxine Maxwell and Linda Harris, the Teepee Creek cemetery was updated in June by recording the additional grave marker information and photographing new grave markers. Jean also continued her work on the Beaverlodge cemetery. Beaverlodge and Hythe cemeteries will be uploaded to the website as time permits.

Fern Dyck photographed Hilltop and Salem cemeteries in Lymburn and Immanuel Cemetery in Goodfare. These photographs have not yet been prepared for upload to the website. Included in future plans is to instruct at least two other people on the preparation of the photographs and excel sheets for uploading to the website.

Volunteer Researcher Report: B. Joan Bowman, one of our researchers, reported that in 2016 the Branch had a variety of queries for information. We were able to provide one biography and twelve newspaper obituaries from the old Grande Prairie newspapers, and two obituaries from the old Peace River newspapers.

Two unsolved queries were published as stories for our branch newsletter, "Heritage Seekers".

Other queries included:

- Headstone locations in five cemeteries, two of which were local cemeteries, one for St. Paul, AB. and two at Plamondon, AB. The Cemetery AGS Database certainly helps in replying to these types of queries.
- Location for one homestead near Sturgeon Heights, AB

- Locating for a family, a grave of a 1953 baby buried in the Grande Prairie Cemetery
- Supplying information to an adoptee looking for information on his birth mother who at one time lived near Grande Prairie, AB
- Military information on a fellow who had lived at Buffalo Lake, AB
- Replying to a query from British Columbia looking for family information at Saskatoon, SK. Referred that query to the Saskatchewan Genealogical Society

Peace Area Newspaper Obituary: Peace area obituaries are clipped and mounted in binders, from 15 area newspapers provided by the Peace Library Systems, then housed in the Isabel Campbell Room of the Grande Prairie Library. With more and more obituaries posted online, Lynda Shopka reviewed the first 160 entries (of the 465 in total), and determined that 93.75% of the extracted obituaries were online in various websites including online local newspapers (*South Peace News, Smokey River Express, Fairview Post, Peace River Gazette*), funeral home sites (Oliver's, Bear Creek) and others. The content was often not the same, the online entries often provided color photos not found in the newspaper.

Obituaries Collected from the *Daily Herald Tribune*: Ed Hall reported that in 2016 a total of 386 deaths were recorded in the obituaries of the DHT. There is often more than one obituary published upon an individual death. In 2016, there were 80 duplicates with the result that 466 obituaries have been added to our DHT collection in the Isabel Campbell Room.

Facebook Report: Patricia Greber is our Facebook Editor. Our group Facebook page is our social media tool to keep us in touch about Branch activities and events and to support each other with shared experience and advice. The Facebook group has 105 members and we work on creating engagement through posting items of interest to members.

Heritage Seekers Newsletter: Freddi Bromling is the Editor of our Newsletter, "Heritage Seekers". It appears quarterly, and in 2016, four issues were published. The newsletter is published electronically and distributed primarily electronically. Hard copies are sent to a few members as well as institutional subscribers. This strategy has cut publication and distribution costs for our branch.

"Heritage Seekers" reports on club events such as speakers, field trips, and projects and encourages members to share and publish their family history research methodologies to provide tips and insights to assist others. Regular features, such as Joan's 'Old Newspapers', provide insight into local history.

Our December issue featured, for the first time, a theme to encourage members to share family history (in this case on the topic "Family Christmas Traditions") in an attempt to make contributing content easy and fun. The diverse and engaging content made this an interesting issue to read, and we will try the theme approach again!

Casino Annual Report: Maxine Maxwell, Casino Chair reported that Grande Prairie & District Branch ran its 3rd successful casino on July 1 & 2, 2016. The Branch received \$31,351.81 in proceeds from this casino to help fund programs and purchases over the next 3 years. Thank you to the 11 members and 5 additional family and friends who volunteered over two days at the Great Northern Casino.

Our annual **Margaret Kay Scholarship** is funded by casino proceeds. In 2016, the scholarship was awarded to **Stephanie Humphreys** of Magrath, Alberta. Also in 2016, we donated funds to **Medicine Hat Branch**, to help with digitization of old Alberta telephone books. We also contributed to the support of the provincial website. In the past we have donated to the **Peace Country Historical Society** land

settlement register digitization project and to the **AGS Provincial Conference** speakers' fund.

Membership Report: Our 2016 membership has been steady at 53 members which is up a little from 2015 as reported by Gwen Richards, Membership Chair. We have lost a few members due to retirements but have gained new members, many of whom are from distant place but have connections to Grande Prairie and the Peace Region.

In remembrance: John Bradley, member #2688, best friend and loving husband to Judy (Gourlay) and devoted father to Charlene Lau (Mike), John, and James (James) died in Grande Prairie on 14th of April 2016, age 65 years. John and Judy contributed tremendously to our Branch and to provincial AGS over the years.

Library and Research Centre Report: Our partnership with the Public Library enables our Branch to host an excellent Library and Research Centre. Gail Schau reported that the Branch has print resources held on Reserve, but also a large selection of circulation items. The Branch has print index storage cabinets, microfilm storage and microfilm reader access. As well, the Library provides a computer with an institutional subscription to *Ancestry.com* resources and family trees.



Projects:

As a follow up to our special project last year - a “School Days Memories” booklet - which was a compilation of the school memories of some of our branch members, our newsletter editor, Sharon Aney, suggested that we once again showcase our creative talents by recording our “Memories of Christmas”. Our submissions by March 31, 2017 will be compiled in a booklet similar to the “School Days Memories” booklet. These 2 ‘memories’ projects are our contribution to the Canada 150 celebrations, and we are very thankful that Sharon’s initiative resulted in some wonderful memories being recorded for future reference.

PROGRAMS & PRESENTATIONS:

January: One of our branch members, Pam Cooke, recently returned from a trip to England. With the assistance of her husband Brian, they treated us to a presentation based on their research trip. Pam told us how initial information, given to her by her family, changed once she began looking into her ancestors and the lives they led. Her trip to England opened up many doors: connecting her to family she didn’t know she had!

February: We were fortunate to have as our guest, Lyn Meehan, AGS Communications/Web Content Manager. Lyn was able to tell us about the move of our Branch data to the new web format that AGS is using. We were all in awe when we saw Lyn’s presentation – the Wetaskiwin branch website will be much improved over the older version and we looked forward to seeing the final product, with the

official launch probably set for the end of this month.

March: We had as our guests this month – AGS President Susan Haga, Edmonton Branch members Mary Ann Legris and Maurice Legris. President Susan commended our Branch on our newsletters and on the work our Branch member Lee Koop had done relating to the new website. She also recognized the work that Lee had done in trying to trace family members of the John and Jennie Arnold family whose photo album (over 100 years of age) was found in a house in Wetaskiwin that was being renovated.

Also in March, guest Patty Caputo gave us an amazing presentation entitled “Family History on the Go”. We learned how using apps on our mobile devices can provide us with an additional way to save and record our family history.

April: Using Spreadsheets for Genealogy – Dan DeWolf, retired instructor at Norquest College, spoke about and demonstrated spreadsheets, particularly Excel and Libra Office. He provided comprehensive notes and elaborated upon them. He illustrated the features of spreadsheet programs and showed how to use them in genealogy research, especially research Logs.

May: Webinar – Taming Your Inner Packrat – This webinar was a great reminder to all of us about how important it is to be organized and to periodically examine the genealogical documents, paperwork, etc. that we have collected over the years. Lisa Alzo gave us some tips about how to reduce the amount of paper we keep and how to store valuable items that cannot be replaced.

June: Webinar – Taming Your Inner Packrat, Part 2 – In this session, we were given lots of information and tips about how to organize documents, photos, files, etc. Some of the most

strongly emphasized points in this presentation were: always back up digital files; keep current with your digital information – upgrading and converting to new technology as it becomes available; keep printed copies of very important/irreplaceable documents; use a research log/planner so you don't duplicate your research; cite sources; stay focused; set a goal.

September: What's New at the "New" Family History Discovery Center in Wetaskiwin. We were given the opportunity to view and use the re-worked Family History Center. There are now several rooms, each featuring a different opportunity to research, view Webinars, look at microfilms, or use the computers with their multitude of databases that are available to anyone using the Center. It was a very interesting evening, and quite a few of our branch members were inspired to try something new – even indexing!

October: Webinar – FamilySearch.org. – For beginners and for everyone! This webinar highlighted the various options for searching, preserving and displaying our family history. The presenter gave us several ideas on how to use the site for researching our ancestral information, recording it, making it available for others, etc.

November: DNA Testing – Due to the overwhelming interest about DNA Testing, Claudia was able to obtain a webinar on this topic and present it to us this evening. The

presenter, Diahna Southard, was amazing – her presentation style had us all glued to our seats! She managed to "untangle" the mystery of DNA testing and gave us an idea of which type of DNA testing would be applicable to our situation.

Our Program Coordinator, Claudia Malloch, has done an outstanding job keeping us educated, inspired and informed about the latest information relating to genealogical research.

Thanks to the hard work of our Branch member Lee Koop, and the work of AGS member Lyn Meehan, our website continues to attract attention. Bylaws and Parliamentarian –

Al Bromling

Volunteer hours – 32

There are no outstanding issues from 2016 parliamentarian activity that warrant a formal recommendation. There are items of interest to share with our Membership.

The matter of a tie vote in the Society Annual or Board meetings was raised:

Our AGS Bylaws (Section 6.1.6) seems to explicitly remove the need for a casting vote. A tie vote means the motion is defeated. This same logic applies to General meetings of AGS (see 5.5.3). There is no casting vote.

The matter of a Board Member accepting responsibility for a second portfolio was raised:

In 2016, the AGS Chair was also the Director from Brooks Branch and the Parliamentarian was also the Director from Grande Prairie Branch. Some discomfort was expressed by members. This practice has the potential to cause stress for the incumbent and possible perceptions of conflict of interest. AGS Bylaws and policy are silent on this matter. It is probably practical and efficient to continue to allow the practice. A free and frank discussion of the practice should accompany an election process where a second portfolio is to be assigned.

The matter of filling in for absent Directors was raised.

The AGS Policy V-70 indicates that the Director may "send an alternate from the Branch Executive". If other Branch Executive Committee members are not available, Article 7.1.2 and 6.1.2 allow the Branch to appoint one Director at Large to expand the Branch Executive Committee. This person could be assigned to represent the Branch on the Provincial Board.

The matter of appropriate means to challenge the behaviour of a Member when there is allegation of abusive or disrespectful treatment of others:

The Volunteer Code of Conduct, 2013-Motion 13/68, sets out standards of civility and respectful treatment for our organization and our work spaces. The Code does not indicate a process to raise a complaint, nor does it establish a review panel or specify an AGS officer accountable for implementation of the Code. The Grievance Settlement Policy (VII-100) provides a step by step process that may be more useful. Member use of this policy could avoid some of the 'escalation by email' that usually worsens controversy and damages relationships.

The matter of the appropriate role of 'in camera' sessions of the Board was raised:

AGS Bylaw Article 6.1.6 states that Board meetings are open to any Member of the Society. The Bylaws and Policy do not address the need for privacy when the Board deals with sensitive, Personnel and other confidential matters. Bylaw Article 9.1 states that Roberts' Rules of Order shall apply in matters not addressed in AGS Bylaws and Policy. Therefore, AGS Board practice is guided by Section 9 of Roberts Rules. The Board may move, by simple majority vote, to go into Executive Session to deal with sensitive matters. Only Board members are present. Any formal action to be taken by the Board, must be debated and approved in a subsequent public portion of the meeting.

In addition to these items, more informal advice on meeting process was provided during Board discussions in 2016.

January to March

The year began in developing the new AGS Homestead webpage and database. Merger of three independent databases took place over Christmas 2015 to stay ahead of deadlines. With the help of Norma Wolowyk in refining and refreshing some historical articles, writing a new descriptive article “The Benefits of Using the AGS Alberta Homestead Index”, this website and database went live in July 2016. An additional 60,000+ entries were uploaded late August and early September. Strategies for the cleanup of the cemetery database have been a topic on several occasions and on record since May 2015. Mock-ups of the database were drawn and prototypes built but incomplete due to delays. It is hoped that in 2017 this project can move forward.

A 40-hour research report was written for Communications own understanding to strategize the principles and relationship between a good website and a good member service database. It was to learn more about the sophistication of the integrated relationship, its advantages, how the business strategy works with technology, the automation of processes, what the Society could be experiencing, the set-backs if the Society discontinues it, transparency and ownership of information, succession planning, street credibility and discussion on ‘what is good business conduct’. The Board report discusses the advantages of its use, such as interactions with our Society members versus the disadvantages of not using one. This

philosophy leverages on technology to create stronger relationships with our former, active and potential members while maximizing our marketing and service capabilities

March to May — Fresh Look into AGS Summer Website Projects

Collaboration is the secret of a Society’s ongoing success! The Communications and Web Content Manager worked alongside the Editor of *Relatively Speaking* to bring members genealogical news. Today, many provincial, federal and international genealogical societies are improving their web content and databases to be mobile-responsive and user-friendly. Taking a step forward, several societies are minimizing their printed resources and turning to ePublishing. This is to assist in practical distribution of their newsletters and periodicals to reduce costs as well as expand communication. AGS is no different! We are always looking for a fresh approach in introducing our Society’s resources and building our membership incentives.

Over the summer of 2016, Communications brought some innovative webpages online:

- *AGS President’s Message, Let’s Talk.* This feature is intended to foster dialogue between members and the AGS Board of Directors. *Let’s Talk* features news, comments, anecdotes, snippets from Board meetings and vision statements about the Society.
- *Visiting Alberta’s Past.* Communications and AGS member John Althouse teamed-up to take his Alberta travelogue electronic. John’s Alberta walkabouts offer insight to geographic places, ghost towns, history and resources that family historians may not have been aware of.
- *AB Homestead Databases.* The three parts of this collection: Applications for Alberta Land Patents, 1885–1897; Alberta Homestead Records, 1870–1930; and Alberta Homesteads Records, post–1930, were merged into one large database over Christmas 2015 consisting of over 520,000 entries. The database grew to over 680,000 entries by August.

- *Relatively Speaking Digital Database* featuring articles from the past 40+ years.
- *AGS Awards: Society Recognition*, a new webpage describing the many wonderful awards our Society distributes to dedicated volunteers who have shown outstanding performance.

May to September

One of the major tasks of Communications/Web Content Manager is to bring information to the Board meetings, and to publish such material on the web. The Web Committee and AGS Media (Web and RS Committees) have always adhered to industry standards, and are open to suggestions with alternatives.

September to December

The AGS Website took a quantum leap from Shout v.5 to v.6.10.1 the first two weeks of October. No pages were broken nor data lost but several little glitches with preferences resetting to default occurred.

Since publication of *Relatively Speaking* was suspended, the administration worked extra hard to diversify communications by electronic means through the web as well as mass email. It was expressed that mass communications come from an array of different AGS positions who work for the benefit of the Society.

Back issues of *Let's Talk* were redesigned in MS-Word then PDF to emulate the online version. This was considered so new members and non-members could read about the growth of the Society under the leadership of any current AGS President.

Brooks & District Branch joined the AGS Web Umbrella. The Brooks web committee was headed by Brian Dunlop. Karyn Norden now heads that committee. Rough completion was done in November 2016. Through teleconferencing they are looking to merge some of their databases.

AGS Membership Statistics—2016

Membership stats were provided to the Membership Chairperson when requested.

Our Society's website statistics were phenomenal with greater than 22,000 users in 2016, viewing over 151,000 pages.

The Future of the AGS Website

The Society's website is in a very healthy condition. We have a good partnership with several Branches and Committee Chairs. We hope more Branches will bring their inspirational stories, their projects and products, and advertise with us. Remember our strength is in teamwork and good communication.

Gaming – Laura Turnbull

AGS Casino event:

I received notification on November 4, 2016 that our next casino event will be on **May 15 & 16, 2017** at Century Casino in Edmonton.

This event helps considerably in raising funds for major operating costs for AGS including rent for our library facility and insurance costs for all Branches.

AGS Raffle or 50/50 event:

We have held 50/50 events at the annual conference. Plans are to again have a 50/50 at the 2017 conference.

Branch gaming events:

Casino:

All Branches (except Edmonton) may apply to hold casino events but some need to share with another Branch. Each Branch has to go through the application processes set up by AGLC.

At present, Brooks/Medicine Hat, Fort McMurray, Grande Prairie, and Lethbridge have held or will hold casinos to help raise funds.

Raffle or 50/50: Medicine Hat – has been holding 50/50 draws at local meetings to help raise funds.

Genealogy for Children and Youth Project – John Althouse

Purpose of the Program:

To develop resources and activities which could be used with children and youth to introduce them to genealogy and family history in pleasant and interesting ways. If such an experience is meaningful, it is hoped that those who experienced it may come back to genealogy and our Society later in life when life provides them with ample leisure time

Initiatives:

1. AGS now provide a youth membership at a reasonable price that young people can afford.
2. AGS has developed two resources for introducing children 6 to 8 years and 9 to 11 years to genealogy, and is considering developing more such resources for other ages and groups. These resources are available to any interested party at no cost. These resources are presented in an engaging manner and are easily downloadable from the AGS website.
3. The website provides a list of supplementary reading resources which adults may use with children to open discussion on family history, aspects of genealogy and other related topics in the home.

4. Presentations about genealogy for children and youth along with the AGS program and resources have also been made at the Saskatchewan Genealogical Society Conference, April 2016 and at the Conference of the Society for German Genealogy in Eastern Europe (an international conference) in Calgary in August 2016.
5. There is a presentation scheduled for the April 2017 AGS Conference to make members aware of the rationale and the need for this project.
6. Work on resources will begin soon to complete a comprehensive overall plan. *“Our Family Home – Here in Alberta and Far Away!”* was completed, placed online, and copyright obtained.
7. Plans for workshops to develop branch facilitators for the program are being planned.
8. AGS provided recognition in the form of certificates to 151 students who completed a family history immigrant project and 5 students who received special mention awards related to their projects. A number of these students shared their presentations with members of Edmonton Branch at their general meetings or within special interest groups of the branch that corresponded to their area of research.
9. Discussions are ongoing on how to better promote and advertise our program and its resources.
10. Books and other media are being acquired and reviewed for consideration as support for our resources and potential inclusion in them.

Grants & Other Funding –

The Alberta Genealogical Society is forever grateful for the funding received through sponsorship from the Alberta Historical

Resources Foundation and the Edmonton Heritage Council. AGS also relies on casino funding, general donations, and research income to help fund their activities.

Meetings Held

As Grants & Other Funding Chair, I attended the May, September, and November AGS board meetings, as well as the AGM and Fall Retreat, as a guest, in order to be current with AGS Board business. I also attended several teleconferences and face-to-face meetings held by the Finance Committee.

Grants

The Alberta Genealogical Society (Provincial) is very appreciative of the funding received through sponsorship from the Alberta Historical Resources Foundation and the Edmonton Heritage Council.

- **Alberta Historical Resources Foundation (AHRF) Sponsorship**—In 2016, AGS received \$36,170 in sponsorship funding from AHRF funded by the Alberta Lottery Fund. The sponsorship received from AHRF is applied to expenses incurred for our publications, training programs, professional consultations and general administration.
- **Edmonton Heritage Council (EHC) Sponsorship**—In 2016, AGS received \$23,029 in operational funding from the EHC funded by the City of Edmonton. This funding helps provide both staffing and operational support.
- **Community Initiative Program Grant (CIP)**—The remaining portion of the CIP grant obtained last year for technology equipment was spent on videoconferencing equipment and the necessary reports were completed.

Gaming/Casino

The Alberta Genealogical Society (Provincial) relied on casino funding raised in 2015. Brooks/Medicine Hat, Fort McMurray, Grande Prairie, and Lethbridge also rely on casino funding. For more information, see Laura Turnbull's report on Gaming.

Number of new members for 2017 who had signed up before the end of 2016 was 37.

Number of new members for 2017 using the online option was 18.

The New Member's Kit was updated and refreshed with new pictures. New membership cards were purchased without a date to allow for longer usage. Each branch was provided with a supply of AGS pins. A welcome letter to new members was written and mailed.

During 2016 there was only one request for cemetery burial listings from the AGS Cemetery Database. Files were converted to PDF format and sent electronically to the purchaser.

Four copies of *Alberta, Formerly the Northwest Territories: Index to Registrations of Births, Marriages and Deaths 1870-1905* were sold in 2016.

Often there were requests for printouts of cemeteries but when the person was contacted they were looking for specific burial record information and so the request was forwarded to the AGS Research Services Committee.

This year-end report is being submitted by the 2nd VP who is the Executive Member responsible for the reporting of this committee and because the Society was without an Editorial staff after finishing the August 2016 issue.

Relatively Speaking in 2016 gave the Alberta Genealogical Society membership three amazing issues. Thank you to Editor Wayne Shephard, Associate Editor Marilyn Hindmarch and the editorial committee for producing these. As volunteers, your time, energy and knowledge was appreciated. Wayne Shephard estimated that he alone spent up to 400+hours per issue. Such dedication and service to the Society and its membership is exemplary and worthy of note.

I believe the collaboration on the Royal Canadian Mounted Police summer issue with the Saskatchewan and Manitoba Genealogical Societies was a first.

The depth of feature articles and columns from various authors in all issues offered great research information and provided wonderful stories.

Unfortunately, the Society received resignations from the Editor and Associate Editor in July 2016 and a Motion at the September board meeting regretfully suspended publishing *Relatively Speaking* until further notice. This suspension gave the Executive time to advertise and interview for the position of a replacement Editor without being under a rigid timeline. The interview process was able to proceed at the end of December with the results to be presented to the Board in February 2017. *Relatively Speaking* will be published again providing the members of the Society with valuable information and stories.

The cost of producing and mailing a printed copy of *Relatively Speaking* for the three issues in 2016 was presented in a report for the Board of Directors and will be addressed in May, 2017.

Research Services – Norma Wolowyk

Committee Members: Gordon Berdahl, Shannon Cherkowski, Gail Cockwill, Natalie Edwards, John Hazelwood, Carol Martyniuk, Claudine Nelson, Pat Pettitt, Jeneane Roberts,

and Norma Wolowyk. Sheila Majeau, who maintained the query database for fourteen years, retired from the Committee in 2016. We thank her for her dedication to the team over so many years.

Meetings: Committee members met each Friday at the AGS Library throughout 2016 except for two Fridays in December.

Projects: Members of the committee responded to research queries which arrived, mainly by email, at the AGS Office each week. 144 queries (177 in 2015) were processed by AGS during 2016. As Edmonton Branch AGS, we processed 258 (229 in 2015). The total queries handled by the Committee was 402 during the year. Queries processed for AGS were requests for copies of Alberta homestead files. In 2016, there were fewer requests for these records as in February 2016 Alberta homestead files were launched on Ancestry.com.

In June 2016, Edmonton Branch approved paying 50% of the copying costs incurred at the Provincial Archives of Alberta. As fewer homestead files (now available on Ancestry.com) are copied most of the copying relates to requests for copies of probate files, newspaper obituaries and vital statistics documents generated from Edmonton Branch AGS queries.

Besides using the resources of the Society's library to respond to queries, committee members used resources at Provincial Archives of Alberta, the Legislature Library, University of Alberta Library, Edmonton Public Library, City of Edmonton Archives, etc. to thoroughly complete the research. They also accessed family history information, on behalf of clients, through their own subscriptions to paid genealogical sites.

Charges billed were fifty cents per page of photocopying and two dollars per page of computer printout from the AGS Cemetery Index. Requests generated from the local history book and probate indexes were charged an additional five dollars and homestead files ten

dollars. Postal charges were added to each query. Also, clients were encouraged to send additional monies to the Society in appreciation of the volunteer commitment given to their queries. These contributions continued to be a valuable source of funding for the Society.

Presentations: Members of the committee contributed articles relating to their research to *Clandigger*, the monthly Edmonton Branch AGS publication. During 2016 Claudine Nelson and Gordon Berdahl met with clients who had travelled from overseas to visit places where their ancestors had lived.

The Alberta Genealogical Society is very fortunate to have such a wonderful group of dedicated researchers. They have a commitment to taking up the research challenge and thus providing family history information to people from around the world with Alberta roots. The committee has received comments on the superior research assistance provided, stating results were beyond their expectations.

Thank you to Linda Winski, AGS Office Coordinator, for handling the mail for the Research Committee and collecting credit card payment information. Her prompt attention to informing Research Committee members that payment has arrived is very much appreciated.

Retreat –

The Retreat Committee consists of Susan Haga and Maxine Maxwell. For the 2016 AGS retreat dates, Maxine had a prior commitment and Susan assumed the responsibility of ensuring the weekend ran smoothly.

The 2016 Retreat was a little different in that we extended an invitation only to the AGS Executive, AGS/Board/Branches and AGS Committee Chairs (or delegate). In the future, we plan to resume the practice of inviting a guest from each Branch along with their respective

delegate. We believe it is important to acquaint as many members as possible to the operations of AGS. In addition, this event is a perfect opportunity to provide a specific focus on a relevant topic for selected guests from all the Branches.

The Friday evening social was facilitated by Susan and started with a round table discussion of genealogical finds over the summer followed by a “Get to Know You” Bingo Genealogy game, complete with prizes. Everyone learned a lot about each other and our respective research journeys and successes. Lethbridge Branch supplied the refreshments, courtesy of Doug & Judith McLeod.

At 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, the business for the weekend began with a Community Development Session presented and tailored to provide guidance to non-profit organizations like ours, operated by volunteers. It was very well received and set a positive tone for the rest of the Retreat.

At 1:00 p.m., the Board meeting commenced and continued through to Sunday noon. The extended Board Meeting was a feedback

On Saturday evening, Lorraine Cathro from the Calgary area, spoke on “Writing Family History with Others: Processes, Rewards, and Challenges”. HIGHLIGHTS OF 2016

OUR MISSION: TO PROVIDE SUPPORT AND SERVICES FOR PEOPLE RESEARCHING THEIR FAMILY HISTORY AND GENEALOGY

- Active since 1973, 2016 was our 43rd year of providing genealogical service to the community.
- Membership for 2016 totalled 743 compared to 704 in 2015.
- Members contributed 32,277 volunteer hours in 2016.
- Our journal, *Relatively Speaking*, published a highly acclaimed joint issue with the Saskatchewan and Manitoba Genealogical societies featuring the early history of the RNWMP.
- The Board initiated the Peter Staveley Memorial Award to recognize significant and important contributions by authors to *Relatively Speaking*.
- The resignation of the editor and associate editor suspended the publication of the fourth issue of *Relatively Speaking*.
- A fact-finding Ad Hoc Committee was struck to address concerns regarding the delivery and future of *Relatively Speaking*.
- Peace River Branch went into dormancy leaving us now with 10 branches to continue to provide diverse programs and services to the membership locally.
- Our 11 Special Interest Groups (SIGs) continued to meet regularly and provide valuable research and discussion topics for their members.
- The Research Committee responded to 402 research queries in 2016.
- The annual September Retreat at the Providence Centre featured a speaker from Community and Culture to lead a discussion on Board Governance for the Board of Directors and Committee Chairs to address wellness concerns.
- “Let’s Talk”, a message from the AGS President, Bob Franz, was introduced as an ongoing feature to the webpage.
- The AGS webpage, under the stewardship of Lyn Meehan, now includes the merged homestead databases in the public section of the website. The website has received acclaim from genealogy and family history societies as well as bloggers nationally and internationally. More than 22,000 users viewed over 151,000 pages.
- Drayton Valley Branch, under the leadership of Connie Stuhl and her committee, held a very successful GenFair in April.
- The AGS Board of Directors held a five hour virtual meeting in November to cut meeting expenses.
- AGS secured funding through membership fees, donations, gaming events, and grants from the Alberta Historical Resources Foundation and the Edmonton Heritage Council.
- The Society continued to employ one part-time Office Coordinator and one part-time bookkeeper.
